The History and Culture of Self Portraiture

Title: Self-Portraiture: A Genre

Grade/Age Level: High school

Time Frame: 1 Class (80 minutes*)

* AUSD classes are 80 minutes.

Description of lesson: Class will begin with a teacher facilitated group discussion answering questions about the purpose of images and photographs of ourselves. Teacher will present a slideshow about the history and cultural significance of the genre of self-portraits. Class will engage in a second discussion regarding the many modes of expression that a self-portrait reflect about the artist. Students will complete a worksheet to assess their understanding of lesson, and examine how artists convey different modes of expression.

- Identify symbolic images included in a self-portrait and analyze their purpose

Procedures:

Anticipatory Set

Open with a full class discussion answering the following questions:

- What is the purpose of self depiction?
- What is the individual's idea behind creating a photograph or painting of oneself?

Direct Instruction

Slide show of History and Culture of The Self-Portrait

- First appearance of the self-portrait
- Society's role in propagating the genre
- Examples of work that highlight different aspects of self-expression
- Conclude with why artists paint them, and why it is important to society

Guided Practice

Teacher facilitated group discussion and dialogue:

- Is a self-portrait the sum of its parts?
- Name and discuss what self-portraits can reveal about the artists

Independent Practice

- Provide students with a handout of the focus artworks
- Complete worksheet titled: History and Culture of Self-Portraits


Accommodations and/or Modifications:

• ELL, Hearing Impaired, Vision Impaired, Learning Disabilities, ADHD- arrange seating for the slideshow so that students with special needs can be seated close to the front of the classroom. During discussions, teacher should repeat or clarify points made the students both to provide the class the opportunity to hear a statement again, as well as to help articulate what a student is trying to say and model how to say it. Students who need support during the independent practice will be paired with another student to discuss a chosen focus artwork and complete the worksheet.

Vocabulary:

- **Self-Portrait** A portrait of oneself done by oneself
- Renaissance Revival; new birth
- Renaissance Art The great revival or art and learning in Europe during the 14th,
 15th, and 16th centuries
- Baroque Art An ornate style of art characterized by high drama, rich colors, high contrast of light and dark, and conveyed movement during the 17th and early 18th centuries
- Post-Impressionism the work or style of a varied group of late 19th-century and early 20th-century artists including Van Gogh, Gauguin, and Cézanne.
 They reacted against the naturalism of the impressionists to explore color, line, and form, and the emotional response of the artist, a concern which led to the development of expressionism.
- Expressionism a style of art that began in 1905 in which the artist seeks to express emotional experience rather than impressions of the external world
- Realism A style of art that begins in the mid 19th century that rejects imaginative idealization in favor of a close observation of outward appearances
- Harlem Renaissance A blossoming of African American culture from 1918-1937 that embraced literary, musical, theatrical, and visual arts
- Surrealism A 20th century movement which sought to release the creative potential
 of the unconscious mind, often resulting in illogical and dreamlike imagery
- **Neo-Expressionism** Characterized by intense subjectivity and the rough emotional handling of materials and use of vivid colors
- Contemporary Art Art made today by living artists
